Background

- Temporary Clinical Librarian post from 2008-2009
- New focus on role with corporate emphasis
- New post created 2009 Clinical Librarian
 - Standards and Guidelines





Shift to supporting corporate needs

- New way of working
- Dealing with non-traditional library users
- Supporting the development and dissemination of local guidelines
- Identification of national guidelines and innovations
- Assisting the conduct of clinical audit
- Ensuring the dissemination of externally and internally generated guidelines, evidence, research, information, and data



Policy & Guideline Committee

- Meets once a month
- Assigned a policy or guideline to review in depth
- Gives advice on key words, titling, referencing etc.
- Useful to have a non-clinical representative present
- Raises profile of the library





Involvement in guidelines

- Finding Vs developing
- Finding:



- New national and international
- Is our practice in line?
- Supporting business cases
- Ensuring our clinical strategies are evidence based
- Background for audits standards needed
- Horizon scanning anticipating user needs



Finding guidelines

- Where to search:
 - Check for national guidelines
 - NICE
 - SIGN
 - NHS Evidence use the guidelines filter
 - DynaMed useful for key updates in clinical areas
 - Royal Marsden Manual
 - Royal Colleges/Associations
 - HDAS

Supporting guideline production

- Advice to authors on process
- Evidence search




- High level e.g. systematic reviews
- National guidelines
- Any other NHS trusts with relevant published guidelines
 - Advanced Google searching add site:nhs.uk in the Google search box after your terms to search NHS websites only
 - Or go into the advanced search page for more options

Box 1: Red flags that should raise substantial skepticism among guideline readers (and medical journals)

- · Sponsor(s) is a professional society that receives substantial industry funding;
- · Sponsor is a proprietary company, or is undeclared or hidden
- · Committee chair(s) have any financial conflict*
- Multiple panel members have any financial conflict*
- · Any suggestion of committee stacking that would pre-ordain a recommendation regarding a controversial topic
- · No or limited involvement of an expert in methodology in the evaluation of evidence
- No external review
- No inclusion of non-physician experts/patient representative/community stakeholders

*Includes a panelist with either or both a financial relationship with a proprietary healthcare company and/or whose clinical practice/specialty depends on tests or interventions covered by the guideline
